




Winklebury Federation Summer Term 2024 Book Recommendations





Chapter books for younger readers






Chapter books for older readers



Little does she realise that she will be chased by vampire sheep and that no-one will believe her when she tells the truth. Lots of laugh out loud moments. Watch out for the great chapter headings and the character file top trumps at the end of the book. The good news is there is more to come in the series. A must for all beast quest fans.





It's always been Jonah's job to look after Rio but when their Mum disappears for good this time they are split up and put into long term foster care. Jonah is distraught when he is sent to live by the sea, because bad things happen by the sea but with the help of a new friend Freddie, an urban fox and a treasure map, Jonah begins to feel stronger and braver to face the future. A raw and emotional story touching on difficult themes with empathy and realism.

Set in Paris in 1940 and based on true events, Safiyyah lives in the compound around the Grand Mosque. The arrival of the Germans sparks fear and uncertainty but, the Muslim community rally round to save their Jewish counterparts. A beautifully written story where religion is set aside in a humanitarian venture. This is an ageappropriate story where the true horrors of war are experienced but humanity wins.
